Reading is critical to your education. Do not take shortcuts. Read Animal Farm, every word! If you need to listen to it while you read, do so. The only way to raise your SAT score is to read. Also, do your own work and work independently. You will have **THREE assignments** to complete.

First, while you are reading, answer the **study guide questions** that are attached to this document. They are due on the first day of school.

The **second** assignment is to get **eight 4X6 note cards** and fill in the literary devices / terms part. (See Part 1 Below)

The **third** and final assignment is to write a complete (500 words and an outline) essay on one of the topics listed below after the questions.

Also on the second day of school, you will have a general quiz over the novel. Many grades will come from this novel, so be sure to read it carefully.

You will receive the following grades based on this book:

- Grade on questions (Turned in on day one)
- Grade on cards (Turned in on day one)
- Grade on Essay (Turned in on day one)
- Grade on quiz (Taken the first day of school)
- Grade on test (after in-class discussions)

Part 3: Essay Topics (Choose just one!)

1. Compare and contrast the ruling styles of Napoleon and Snowball. Where do they succeed? Where do they fail? How are they similar as well as different?
2. Analyze how the pigs rose to power. Think of what tools they used to keep the others down. (Hint. Propaganda is a good one)
3. Write about and analyze some of the symbols featured in the story and what they represent.
